Dear collaborators,

We are so proud to present the 2016 Progress Report for the New Brunswick Children’s Environmental Health Collaborative.

This report highlights the milestones achieved by the Children’s Environmental Health (CEH) Collaborative in regards to the [Strategy for Action](#). 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1. Introduction

Vision

To provide a clean and healthy environment for children in New Brunswick.

Mission

To work collaboratively to improve children's health and wellbeing by increasing children's exposure to healthy environments and reducing children's exposure to environmental hazards that may contribute to illness, disability, disease or death.

Overview

Children are more vulnerable than adults to chemicals found in the environment, and it is important that they are protected, now and in the future. In recent years, community organizations have been raising concerns about the effects of chemicals in the environment on children's health, and began public awareness and education campaigns to draw attention to the harm that children may experience from chemical pollutants in air, soil, water and food.

In May 2005, in response to these growing concerns, a committee of New Brunswick organizations and agencies began discussions on developing a strategy for action to reduce children's exposure to environmental contaminants that may affect health by causing illness, disability, disease or death. From these discussions, it was decided to establish a broad network of government departments, non-government organizations, private sector agencies, communities and individuals who are interested in working collaboratively to address this issue. After several meetings and discussions, the Children's Environmental Health Collaborative was created.

The format of the collaborative effort is one which brings all stakeholders together in a spirit of mutual cooperation and encourages each agency to contribute in whatever way possible. Like a braid, this effort is made stronger by intertwining everyone's efforts. Agencies participating in the collaborative effort pool resources, expertise, knowledge and experience and, through building upon each other's strengths, develop and implement a coordinated action strategy that will benefit all of New Brunswick.

In the eleven years since its inception, the Collaborative has achieved some important milestones, including the development of a collaborative model, a strategy for action, an implementation plan and concrete outcomes based on the plan. The intent of this report is to document this progress, demonstrating the incredible gains made associated to each of the action strategy's goals, as well as providing a vision for the future.

2. Key Achievements

Goal 1: Develop and maintain a collaborative effort of stakeholders in New Brunswick

- New Brunswick is the first province to establish a diverse province-wide collaborative effort to reduce children's exposure to environmental hazards, linking over 350 people from over 100 agencies representing 21 sectors.
- Action strategy developed and continuously updated as a living document.
- Narrative and assessment of collaborative effort completed (see appendix 1).
- One to two provincial conferences held per year since 2006, with conference themes ranging from "Get Em' Outside" to "The Power of Collaboration" (see appendix 2).
- Communicating among stakeholders achieved through tools including a listserv, a webpage and a Facebook page.
- Several active stakeholder teams formed around action strategy goals.

Goal 2: Develop and advance educational opportunities for families and professionals

- Two collaborative stakeholder teams, Team Nurses and Team Education, actively addressing this goal with the involvement of public health and community health practitioners.
- Presentations conducted on children's environmental health at multiple professional conferences such as the Canadian Institute of Planners and the International Association for Ecology and Health.
- Webinar entitled, "Nursing in the Anthropocene: the challenge of nursing practice in an age of environmental turmoil" developed for nurses and available on the Nurses Association of New Brunswick website.
- Outreach and training conducted to frontline health and family workers.
- Support the inclusion of children's environmental health in nursing school curriculum.

Goal 3: Encouraging and promoting research

- Collaborative working group actively addressing this goal, with long range aim of supporting the establishment of research chairs on children's environmental health in New Brunswick.
- Jointly developed a CIHR Team Grant proposal for the project "The ECHO Network (Environment, Community, Health Observatory): Strengthening intersectoral capacity to understand and respond to health impacts of resource development" with colleagues in British Columbia and Alberta.

Goal 4: Improve policy and legislation

- Healthy Environments Branch established in the New Brunswick Department of Health under the Office of the Chief Medical Officer of Health.
- A legislative instrument for children's environmental health drafted and published, the *Bill of Rights to Protect Children's Health from Environmental Hazards*.
- Briefings held with multiple provincial policy makers.
- Outreach to Ministers of Health and Social Development led to ground-breaking work planning on children's environmental health with all stakeholder departments invited.

3. Progress Report on Goals and Objectives

The following section presents the status of all activities related to the six goals of the Children's Environmental Health Strategy for Action. For each objective, the actions have been listed using the following legend: ongoing, in progress, complete, planned and opportunity to explore.

Goal 1: To develop and maintain a collaborative effort of all stakeholders involved in children's environmental health in New Brunswick

Objective 1(a): Establish a collaborative effort of all organizations involved in children's environmental health

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Engage stakeholders in strategy development and implementation via multi-stakeholder conferences on annual or twice yearly basis.
- Support collaborative stakeholder teams in furthering the goals of the action strategy.
- Identify additional partners and conduct outreach efforts to engage them in implementing the strategy.
- Maintain stakeholders list and obtain contact information for ongoing communication and liaison among all stakeholders.
- Secure sufficient fiscal resources to enable the collaborative effort.

2010 – 2015

- Communications plan for the collaborative developed.
- Online forum created for participants to discuss Children's Environmental Health issues to facilitate internal communication among and between teams.
- Narrative description and analysis of the Collaborative completed.
- Evaluation framework for the Collaborative effort prepared.
- Collaborative participants surveyed based on evaluation framework.
- Logo for the CEH Collaborative developed.

2006 – 2009

- Children's Environmental Health collaborative effort Planning Committee established.
- Action strategy ratified at province-wide meeting.
- Strategic Committee established as permanent multi-stakeholder decision-making body.
- Implementation structures and accountability framework finalized.
- Multistakeholder teams formed.

Opportunity to explore!

- Develop participant engagement knowledge-product based on analysis of Collaborative.

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- Develop resources and funding knowledge-product based on the analysis of Collaborative.
- Evaluate data from evaluation of the Collaborative.

Objective 1(b): Encourage the involvement of all stakeholders including government departments and parents, children's, health and environmental organizations

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Inform stakeholders on progress.
- Hold regular meetings of stakeholder teams.
- Continue to engage representatives from the key provincial government departments.
- Collaborate with the Canadian Partnership for Children's Health and the Environment on national initiatives.
- Conduct outreach to the Department of Education, health NGOs and community and family groups.

2016 - In progress

- Recruit additional partners to Children's Environmental Health Collaborative Strategic Committee to ensure broad representation.

2010 – 2015

- Annual self-evaluation process for teams developed and implemented.
- Published progress reports in 2012 and in 2014 based on the six goals of CEH Strategy for Action.
- Met with representatives from every New Brunswick department whose mandate has impacts on this issue.

2006 – 2009

- Implementation Network established to improve communication among teams through semi-annual meeting (June 2009).

Objective 1(c): Build capacity within the stakeholder groups

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Assist the stakeholders to build partnerships to leverage in-kind support and funds for the activities of the collaborative effort.
- Conduct professional development during annual meetings of the collaborative effort.
- Identify current programs and activities and build linkages.

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2010 – 2015

- Developed workplans with collaborative stakeholder groups (“Teams”).
- Developed vision and mission for Team Nurses.

Goal 2: To develop and advance educational opportunities for families and professionals

Objective 2(a): Identify quality educational tools and increase their accessibility

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Share educational tools via team listserv, the CEH listserv, the CEH webpage and the CEH Facebook page.

2010 – 2015

- Developed Fact Sheets and newsletter articles on Bisphenol A for nurses, nurse practitioners, education students, teachers and parents.

2006 - 2009

- Inventory of educational resources on contaminants developed.
- Informational texts provided to adult literacy organizations.

Objective 2(b): Inform families and professionals about environmental health concerns for children

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Educate and connect with local health professionals on the importance of children’s environmental health issues.
- Encourage development of local New Brunswick professionals’ knowledge-base through publicizing existing learning opportunities such as conferences, webinars and workshops.
- Promote children’s environmental health and the Collaborative via collaborative participants engaged in professional societies, including members of Canadian Nurses for Health and Environment and Canadian Community of Practice in Ecosystem Approaches to Health Canada advisory committee (2013 – ongoing).
- Promote inclusion of children’s environmental health in nursing school curriculum.
- Engage in dialogue on the nurse's role in environmental health.

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2016 - In progress

- Develop and implement a communications plan, which aims to raise awareness among families and professionals on issues related to the effects of chemicals on children's health (Team Education).

2010 – 2016

- Connected with families by presenting an interactive and educational booth that was focused on children's environmental health issues during the annual fredkid Fair in Fredericton (April 2016).
- Published an article called "Nursing and Climate Change: The time to act is now" in Info Nursing (spring 2016 edition).
- Webinar entitled "Nursing in the Anthropocene: the challenge of nursing practice in an age of environmental turmoil" developed for nurses and available on the Nurses Association of New Brunswick website (2016).
- Engaged children and families during the launch of the public engagement phase for a Bill of Rights supporting children's environmental health (June 2014).
- Lead a special session at professional planning conference People Matter by the Canadian Institute of Planners, in collaboration with the Atlantic Planners Institute (summer 2014).
- Keynote panel presentation at the 5th Biennial Conference of the International Association for Ecology & Health titled "EcoHealth 2014: Connections for Health, Ecosystems and Society".
- Presentations delivered on reducing exposure to BPA to University of New Brunswick education students, wellness representatives for three school districts (along with other information), Home and School members, and nursing students.
- Conducted media interviews on BPA and what the public can do to reduce exposure.
- Communicated with health professionals about the NB nursing stakeholder team model and achievements on educating families and child service providers on reducing children's exposure to contaminants: presentation to the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing, article published in the newsletter of the Canadian Nurses for Health and the Environment and presentation at Community Health Nurses of Canada conference.
- Meeting held with the Nurses Association of New Brunswick.
- Participated in the inaugural teleconference held in April 2014 to form an international nurses network on children's environmental health to share tools and best practices (endorsed by the Health Care Without Harm).
- Connected with local health professionals on the importance of children's environmental health issues (article on children's environmental health published in the NB Nurses' Association Journal in winter 2013 and meeting with "Doctors for You" in 2013).
- Developed programs and conducted training:
 - 127 New Brunswick children's service providers trained in 2008 and 26 people equipped to train their colleagues in 2009.
 - Workshop given for early child care providers on naturalizing childcare outdoor areas during Early Childhood Care & Education New Brunswick event in 2010.

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- Promoted inclusion of children's environmental health in nursing school curriculum by a presentation to Atlantic Region Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing annual meeting in 2011.

Objective 3(a): Support the preparation of comprehensive reports on New Brunswick children's environmental health

Activity Status

- Encourage the establishment of children's environmental health indicators.

- Initiated contact and met with the Canada Research Chair in Spatial and Social Inequalities of Health at UNB to explore areas of mutual interest, particularly around the development of indicators of children's environmental health (2016).

- Built a cooperative network of New Brunswick researchers addressing issues related to children's environmental health.

- Establish environmental health portrait of New Brunswick children.
- Encourage surveillance mechanisms to collect data on the incidence of children's disease related to exposure to contaminants.

- Encourage national research into health effects of environmental contaminants.

- Letter of intent submitted in 2014 to the Commission for Environmental Cooperation on mapping of health indicators to identify hotspots (research proposal chosen at the June 2012 meeting).
- Letter of intent submitted to Canadian Institutes of Health Research and Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada for a collaborative project on the health of mothers and infants in Chaleur Bay.

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Objective 3(c): Support research that identifies and fills gaps in best practices in children's environmental health.

Objective 3(d): Work towards sufficient resources for research

 **Opportunity to explore!**

- Initiate call for Children's Environmental Health research chairs in New Brunswick.

Goal 4: To improve policy and legislation related to children's environmental health

Objective 4(a): Spearhead and work collaboratively with national policy and legislative initiatives

Activity Status

2010 – 2016

- Partnered with the David Suzuki Foundation's cross-Canada Blue Dot Tour to promote the right to a healthy environment for all Canadians (2014).

2006 – 2009

- Engaged New Brunswick agencies to provide input to the Report of the National Policy Consultation on Children's Health and Environment published by Canadian Partnership for Children's Health and Environment.

Objective 4(b): Encourage the establishment of government agencies and the development of legislation to uphold the rights of children to a healthy environment

Activity Status

- Working collaboratively with the East Coast Environmental Law Association to advance environmental rights in the province.

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☑ 2010 – 2016

- Supported the establishment of a NB Environmental Health Bureau; now the Healthy Environments Branch, NB Department of Health.
- Initial meeting of the NB Environmental Rights Working Group, hosted by the East Coast Environmental Law Association, during which the draft Bill of Rights was discussed. This provides another opportunity and avenue through which the draft Bill of Rights will be advanced (March 2016).

- Encourage the establishment of a Children's Environmental Health Commissioner.

Objective 4(c): Advance specific provincial legislative or policy initiatives to reduce children's exposure to environmental hazards

Activity Status

- Work with the Healthy Environments Branch with the Department of Health to assist in strategically advancing children's environmental health issues.
- Recruit new partners and supporters for the Bill of Rights work.
- Collect organizations names for sign-on to statement of need for a bill of rights to protect children's health from environmental hazards.

✍ 2016 - In progress

- Develop public engagement strategy for NB Children's Environmental Health Bill of Rights.
- Develop the Children's Environmental Health Bill of Rights Ambassadors Program.

☑ 2010 – 2015

- Environmental Bill of Rights legislation in other jurisdictions investigated.
- Process for tabling bills in New Brunswick researched.
- Ensured the incorporation of both "health" and "children" into the draft NB Environmental Bill of Rights as proposed by the NB Environmental Law Society.
- New Brunswick Bill of Rights to Protect Children's Health from Environmental Hazards developed and published.
- National profile on Bill of Rights project attained via panel at Canadian Public Health Association Annual Conference.
- Feedback from collaborative participants on the substantive Bill of Rights gathered and incorporated.
- Publicly launched the proposed CEH Bill of Rights and engaged stakeholders in project at event with children's singer Raffi and Dr. Eilish Cleary, New Brunswick's Chief Medical Officer of Health (2014).

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- Guidelines on green conference initiatives developed and implemented by the Community Health Nurses of Canada (CHNC) (Spring 2010).

2006 – 2009

- Legislation encouraged banning the cosmetic use of pesticides.

Opportunity to explore!

- Promote prevention over exposure as a health care approach.
- Work with the Department of Health to incorporate children's environmental health information into guidelines for public health inspection of day care facilities.

Objective 4(d): Support the incorporation of children's environmental health concerns into provincial government initiatives through multiple departments

Activity Status

Ongoing

- Meet with policy makers from each Department, including Ministers, Deputy Ministers and senior staff.
- Continue with the Trilateral Committee meetings and build on this, based on the interest shown at the June 2014 meeting (attended by 13 government agencies).

2010 – 2016

- Meeting with Chris Collins, Member of the Legislative Assembly and Speaker of the House and children's environmental health ally, to solicit his advice on the best way to move the draft Bill forward with the current government (February 2016).
- Meeting with Cathy Rogers, Minister of Social Development, to solicit her advice on the best way to move the draft Bill forward with the current government (February 2016).
- Meeting with Cathy Rogers, Minister of Social Development and child rights advocate, to present the draft Bill of Rights to Protect Children from Environmental Hazards (2015).
- Briefing with Cathy Rogers, Minister of Social Development, and Victor Boudreau, Minister of Health, on issues and solutions regarding children's environmental health, in particular the draft Bill (August 2015).
- Met with political parties to educate them about children's environmental health issues and the Bill of Rights including the Liberal Association of NB Executive Director, the NDP and the Green Party (spring and summer 2013).
- Assisted in establishing formal links between the Department of Environment, Department of Health, and the Department of Education, relating to children's environmental health issues (meeting with Ministers of Health and Healthy and Inclusive Communities on Children's Environmental Health was held in March 2013).

Objective 5(a): Focus on multiple pathways of exposure to environmental contaminants, including those from food, water, soil, air and consumer products

- Identify contaminants or groups of contaminants that may adversely affect children's health where they live, learn, and play.
- Establish environmental and exposure baselines for contaminants.
- Establish criteria to assess contaminant exposures.
- Prioritize contaminants or groups of contaminants for strategic actions.

Objective 5(b): Address multiple exposures in children by promoting the use of action-oriented frameworks such as human health risk assessment, health impact assessment, and ecosystem approaches to health

Appendix 1

Evaluation: “Web of Action” for Children’s Environmental Health in New Brunswick

Given the rapid growth of the Collaborative, and the forward momentum, an initial evaluation of the Collaborative was conducted in 2012. The evaluation consists of two parts, the *Web of Action for Children’s Environmental Health in New Brunswick*, which documents the narrative of the Collaborative thus far, and an evaluation framework for future use.

Through this evaluation, respondents noted significant changes within their agencies as a result of their participation in the Collaborative.

- Participants initiated changes in their spheres of influence, which contributed to cleaner, healthier workplace environments and safer environments for children.
- Participants increased their own capacity to address children’s environmental health issues and, subsequently, built capacities within their agencies.
- By providing networking and collaborating opportunities, the Collaborative has helped to remove barriers and build bridges between and among government and non-government agencies.
- The Collaborative work has directly and indirectly supported the work of the many agencies within its sphere of influence.

Many successes of the model were identified, and some of which include:

- Strong networks and working relationships initiated and maintained among government and non-government organizations
- An improved understanding of organizational cultures and how to work with them
- Culture of acceptance and openness to new ideas within the Collaborative – “a safe place” to explore solutions to complex issues
- Strengthened capacities within participants, agencies and communities
- Shared responsibility and shared results through collaborative relationships
- Mobilization of the resources of many sectors
- Significant steps toward solving challenging and complex issues in children’s environmental health

Findings from the Evaluation show that the New Brunswick Children’s Environmental Health Collaborative has made significant gains for the issue in terms of public and professional awareness, representation from a broad spectrum of sectors, actions to reduce exposures on many fronts, and building a level of “readiness for change” within government and non-government spheres of influence.

At this point in time, with the groundwork laid, the networks and collaborations activated, capacity-building begun and early goals met or in progress, participants have articulated a readiness for continuing to build the network and producing concrete, trans-disciplinary, multi-sectoral and multi-cultural advancements on children's environmental health.

Impact of participation in collaborative effort

In 2013, using the Evaluation framework developed for the collaborative effort in 2012, an interactive survey was conducted with responsive devices at the fall province wide meeting and a focus group was conducted at an Implementation network meeting with team leads and the Strategic Committee in September 2013. Preliminary results from the survey suggest that participation in the collaborative resulted in increased awareness of children's environmental health issues as well as new and improved connections and working relationships.
